

THE COST OF REBELLION Hebrews 10:26-39

Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote *The Cost of Discipleship* in which he spoke of costly grace – a compelling statement of the demands of sacrifice. What we don't realize is that for the follower of Jesus Christ, the cost of rebellion is much higher.

If we deliberately keep on sinning ...

The Christian's deliberate sin is	<mark>calculated</mark> ,	intentional	, and	<mark>consistent</mark>
<mark>over time</mark> .				

The Christian's deliberate sin is <mark>minimized</mark>, <mark>rationalized</mark>, and <mark>ultimately</mark> ignored.

We have a strange illusion that being a forgiven sin <mark>voids all</mark> consequence

It is not that we don't sin; it's that we don't care.

Avoiding the danger ...

Remember your earlier days

Confidence killers – why we just give up			
Apathy – "I've paid my dues"			
Indifference – "It really doesn't matter"			
Busy-ness – "I'm overwhelmed, overscheduled, and exhausted"			
Laziness – "I'd rather just enjoy my stuff and my life."			
Hurt – "I can't (won't) trust anyone anymore."			
<u>Compromise</u> – "I'm just looking for a way out."			

The challenge ...

Don't exchange <mark>reality</mark> for <mark>an illusion</mark>.

- Read and jot down in your own words the basic idea of those who are intentional in their sin and rebellion. Psalm 68:6; 78:8; Ezekiel 3:26; 12:2.
- 2. Read Hebrews 10:19-25 and identify three positive commands that precede this stark warning.

3. Read the problem of Ephesus in Revelation 2:1-5. How does their problem relate to the challenges that the writer gives in Hebrews 10:32-35?

4. Look back over the confidence killers on page two of the notes. Does one of those or anything else stand out to you that might present a particular danger? *Note: What is the particular danger if we believe this couldn't happen to us? (1 Cor 10:11-12)*

5. What would you do to avoid the danger that would lead you away?

If you deliberately stopped doing these commands as a pattern of life, would this warning apply to you? How would these sins show themselves?
