Paul viewed the church as God's <u>family</u>, the <u>pillar and foundation of</u> <u>truth</u>.

Rules for rules' sake isn't just a bad idea, it's abandoning the faith.

What demons teach sometimes doesn't sound that bad ...

Sometimes it actually looks good.

The siren song of some false teachers

They mistook <mark>misery</mark> for <mark>godliness</mark>

They mistook denial for devotion

A return to simplicity

God's creation is made for our blessing and enjoyment

God created things to be <u>accepted</u>; not <u>rejected</u>

God created things to be <u>used</u>; not <u>abused</u>

God's hand in blessing is recognized by prayer

Godliness is not a function of how much we accept or deny, it is a function of our transformed hearts to glorify God through Jesus Christ (1 Cor 10:31, 33)

Digging deeper

1. Read 1 Timothy 3:15. What are the first things that pop into your mind when you read "how people ought to conduct themselves in the household of God"?

2. What does it mean to you that the church is the pillar and foundation of the truth?

3. Read 1 Timothy 4:1 and then verse 3. Paul identifies the teaching of demons with things that are of great sacrifice and personal denial. Do most people think that demons would teach sacrifice and denial? Hard thought question: Why would demons be interested in teaching things for which people would need great discipline and self-control?
