He comes to show (John 1:1-14)

His backstory is <u>completely foreign to us</u>. There's no way we could

He came to serve (Philippians 2:5-8)

It's not just about <mark>what he did</mark>, it's also about <mark>what he showed us by</mark> <mark>doing it</mark>.

He gave up the benefits <u>of his deity</u> for the liabilities <u>of humanity</u>.

He came to relate (Hebrews 4:14-16)

In coming, he showed us what success looks like.

In coming, he showed us what understanding looks like.

In coming he doesn't just come to where we are, he invites us <u>to go to</u> where he is. Last Sunday Jim opened up a series on what Jesus does for us, specifically, that he comes for us. This concept of the incarnation of the Son of God in Jesus is incredible.

3. John 1:14 says that in spite of all of the frailties we beheld his glory. We often speak of the presence of Christ, and his future glory, but we don't think so much of his glory on earth. What are some "grace and truth" glories that led John to write this?
