Fierv ordeals should be expected (1 Peter 4:12)

(Matthew 5:10-12; 10:14, 17, 21-36; John 15:18-21; Acts 4:3; 5:41; 7:58; 12:5; 14:19, 22; 1 Corinthians 4:8-13; 2 Corinthhians 6:18-10; James 1; 1 Peter 4:4)

Why are we always so surprised?

Fiery ordeals are fiery because of their intensity, and fiery because of their purpose.

Hardships are part of life; trials are part of the faith.

Fierv ordeals should prompt rejoicing (1 Peter 4:13)

(1 Peter 1:6-7; Acts 5:40-41)

We don't rejoice because we're suffering; we rejoice because we're

accomplishing something!

Suffering is not a sign of God's absence; it's a sign of his presence.

Fierv ordeals should prompt evaluation (1 Peter 4:14–18) (Malachi 3:1-4)

Suffering for Jesus' name gives God's approval and glory.

When we bring it on ourselves, suffering reminds us it's time to change our ways.

If you keep <u>bumping into the same wall</u>, maybe it's time to <u>look</u> for the doorway.

Fierv ordeals should be prompt trust (1 Peter 4:19) (Luke 23:46)

When we do it right, we suffer for doing God's will, God's way.

When we do it right, when the going gets tough, we keep on being faithful.
